Unspeakable Joy

Joy is based on certain <u>truths</u> that we are confident in and not the situations that we encounter.

Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be. James 3:10

True and lasting joy is the result of Jesus' presence in our lives.

Three personal practices to increase our joy

- 3. Employ a new_song.
- 4 Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! 5 Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. 6 Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. 7 And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:4-7
- 8 Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. Philippians 4:8
